## Pastor's Page



**"This Jesus God raised up,  
and of that all of us are  
witnesses"** (Acts 2:32).

Have you ever been called upon by the court system to testify in a case? I remember three specific times I had to appear in court as a witness. One was because I was the retail employee who watched a man deliberately walk out of the store without paying for the box of cigars in his hand. I was in court all morning for this, lined up with other retailers that he had stolen from, and the defendant made a plea agreement with the judge, and before the morning was over, I walked out the courthouse doors WITH the man who stole from my company. That was disheartening AND scary!

Another appearance I had to make was because of an automobile accident in which a woman scraped her front bumper all the way down the side of my car. She brought her front tire (!) into the court room, claiming the markings on her tire showed that I was the one who was at fault. The bailiffs got a hoot out of that, as if they had "seen everything now!"

The most comedic courtroom appearance for me to share with you was from my college days. A man had been breaking into apartments in the complex where my roommate and I lived, and we became victims. My roommate suffered more in his loss than I did. The man stole his soon-to-be fiancé's ring. What did I lose? Our microwave! For a college student to lose their microwave is like cutting off their oxygen supply. Well, their food chain supply...

When the prowler was finally caught, all the victims

showed up in court to name their losses at the hearing. Where is the comedy? One of the victims testified that his favorite expensive pair of jogging shoes was stolen. The prosecutors began giggling and they interrupted the judge and asked, "Your honor, could the shoes that the defendant is wearing in court be those very shoes?"

The judge immediately said, "I've seen enough!", and scheduled the man's trial date. My roommate's engagement ring? It was never found...BUT...the couple never got married to each other anyway, and everyone lived happily ever after.

In Eastertide, there is plenty for us to bear witness to. "We have seen the Lord!" We join the disciples in taking notes from each other and proclaiming what it is that God has done for us.

In Acts 2, Peter proclaimed to the people that God made good on God's promises and raised Jesus from the dead. We may not be firsthand witnesses to Jesus dying in Jerusalem and later appearing to the disciples, but we indeed are witnesses to Jesus' resurrection power which gives us new life every single day of our lives.

## Ministry Project Ideas

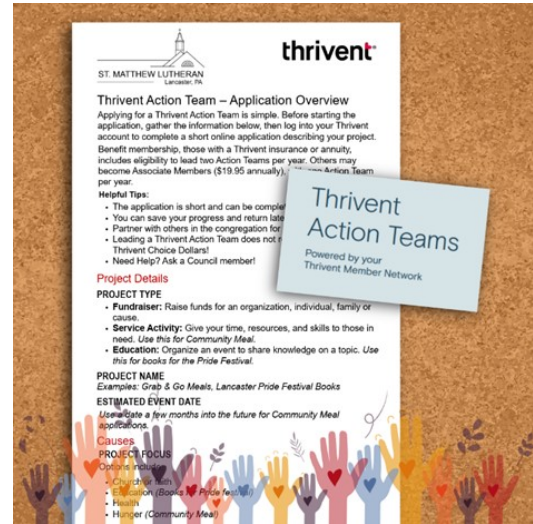
### Have an Idea for a Ministry Project?

Do you know of a need in our church or community—or have an idea for a project—but aren't sure how to fund it? A Thrivent Action Team grant may be a great option.

Thrivent Action Teams provide \$250 in seed money, along with resources to help bring your idea to life. Projects can support fundraisers, service activities, or educational events—whether it's something new or an extension of an existing ministry.

Members have recently received funding to support the Community Meal ministry and to purchase

copies of *UnClobber: Rethinking Our Misuse of the Bible on Homosexuality*, the book being distributed at upcoming Pride festivals.



The application is short and can be completed in one sitting. Consider partnering with others in the congregation for ideas and support!

To be eligible, individuals must be Thrivent members. Those with a Thrivent insurance or annuity have benefit membership and may lead up to two Action Teams per year. Others may become Associate Members (currently \$19.95 annually) and are eligible to lead one Action Team per year.

Many St. Matthew members direct their Thrivent Choice Dollars to our congregation—please know that participating in an Action Team does not reduce or impact those dollars in any way.

## Conversation Around the Corner

It's time for another Conversation Around the Corner!

On Tuesday, May 5, St. Matthew will host "Tales from the Beeyard," a presentation by Cornell University Certified Master Beekeeper Lori Stahl.

Lori felt called to beekeeping in the late 1990s, never imagining the journey she was beginning. Over time, her work with honeybees led to the founding of BeeBee's All Naturals, featuring products such as honey, beeswax candles, and soaps. She also offers bee education talks and rescues swarms, removing and rehomeing honeybee colonies each season.

In this engaging presentation, she will share her personal beekeeping journey while offering insights into the fascinating world of honeybees.

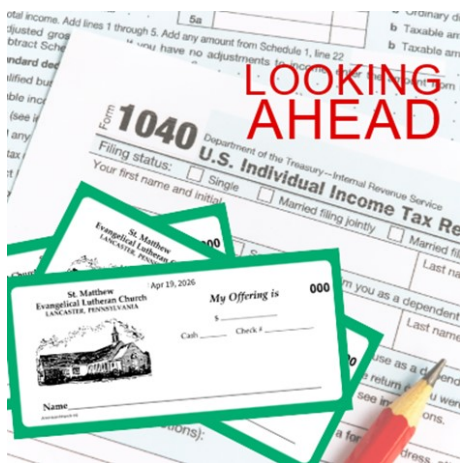
Lori earned her Cornell University Master Beekeeper certification in 2019 and currently maintains several apiaries throughout Lancaster and southeastern York County. She also serves on the Pennsylvania Honeybee Advisory Board and has represented the Pennsylvania State Beekeepers Association on the Pennsylvania Farm Council, chaired its legislative committee, and served as treasurer of the Lancaster County Beekeepers Society.



Through her work, she is committed to educating both the public and fellow beekeepers on ways to support and protect honeybees.

### A 2026 Update on Charitable Giving

Just when you thought you could stop thinking about taxes for the year, here's a quick update for 2026! In the past, charitable contributions could only be deducted if a taxpayer itemized deductions

on Schedule A of Form 1040. Beginning with tax year 2026, individuals who do not itemize may deduct up to \$1,000 in cash contributions to qualified charitable organizations (\$2,000 for those filing jointly).

While generosity is rooted in gratitude and faith rather than tax considerations, this change may be helpful as you plan your giving. As always, please consult your tax professional for guidance about your specific situation.

#### Why We're Showing Up: St. Matthew at Pride This June

This June, St. Matthew Lutheran Church will be participating in both Lancaster Pride (June 20<sup>th</sup> at Penn Medicine Park) and Lititz Pride (June 6<sup>th</sup> at 727 Furnace Hills Pike, Lititz) and we hope you'll consider joining us.

At its core, Pride is about visibility, belonging, and celebrating the dignity of every person. As a congregation, this aligns deeply with who we are and what we believe: that all people are created in God's image and are worthy of love, welcome, and community.

Showing up at Pride is one way we live out our faith beyond our walls. It's a chance to say clearly and publicly: *you are welcome here*. For many in the LGBTQ+ community, that message has not always been something they've heard from churches. Our presence matters, it helps create a different

experience of faith, one rooted in compassion, inclusion, and grace.

### Why Your Presence Matters

You don't need to have all the right words. Simply being there, smiling, handing out materials, or walking alongside others—can be powerful. When people see a church showing up with openness and kindness, it can begin to rebuild trust and open doors for connection.

Whether you've participated in Pride before or this would be your first time, your presence helps reflect the heart of our congregation.

### What to Expect

If you're feeling unsure, you're not alone—and we want you to feel comfortable.

Here's what participation typically looks like:

- A joyful, welcoming environment with music, vendors, and community organizations.
- St. Matthew will have a table at both events and in the past has shared our table with other open and affirming congregations.
- Volunteers might help greet visitors, hand out small items, or simply engage in friendly conversation.
- You're welcome to come for as little or as long as you'd like, there's no pressure to stay the whole time.
- There's no expectation to debate, defend, or have all the answers. This is about presence, kindness, and connection.

We understand that for some, this may feel new or even a little outside your comfort zone. That's okay. Participating in Pride is not about being perfect; it's about being present.

If you've been looking for a way to live out your faith in a tangible, community-centered way, this is a meaningful opportunity.

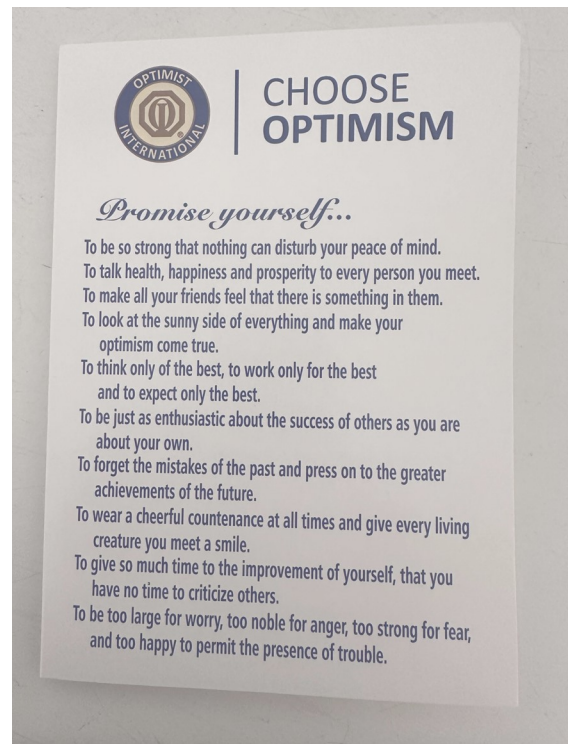
